Rabbi Lewis H. Kamrass. **Senior Rabbi**

Rabbi Kamrass is the Senior Rabbi of Isaac M. Wise Temple of Cincinnati, Ohio, where he has spent his entire rabbinate of

nearly thirty-nine years. Rabbi Kamrass is a Phi Beta Kappa, summa cum laude graduate of the University of Georgia in Sociology and Psychology, with a Master of Hebrew Letters and Rabbinic Ordination from Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC-JIR), as well as recipient of an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree. He served for 25 years as an Instructor in the Theology Department of Xavier University and as adjunct faculty at HUC-JIR.* In the national Reform movement, Rabbi Kamrass currently serves as Immediate Past President of the Central Conference of American Rabbis, the 2200-member international body of Reform Rabbis, and also serves on its Board. He has served as a Board Member of the HUC-JIR* and the Union for Reform Judaism.

Rabbi Zachary S. Goodman, **Associate Rabbi**

Rabbi Goodman was born and raised in Dallas, Texas and attended the University of Texas at Austin before he was ordained on the Cincinnati campus of HUC-JIR.* Following his ordination in 2019, Rabbi Goodman served as the Assistant Rabbi at Holy Blossom Temple in Toronto before joining the Wise Temple family in the summer of 2022. Rabbi Goodman is passionate about Israel education, youth and teen engagement, young professional programming, and learning in all its many forms. 
Jamie Starr, Rabbinic Fellow August 13, 20

Getting to Know Rabbi Neil P.G. Hirsch



Can you share a bit about yourself and

your background? I grew up in Houston with parents who are dedicated to our Jewish family and community. I attended a Jewish day school, and we were Friday night Shabbat regulars. My wife—Rabbi Liz Hirsch—grew up in Boston, where she was raised similarly. Liz and I met as staff at the URJ Eisner Camp, and this November, we will celebrate 10 years of marriage. We would not be who we are professionally or as a family were it not for the Jewish imprints our families left on us. So, now, as the parents of a 7-year-old and a 3-year-old, it is satisfying to see both kids delight in their Jewish family and take joy in a vibrant Jewish community.

What made you want to become a rabbi? I became a rabbi because of my rabbis and mentors. In the third grade, I covered the religion beat for the school newspaper. I interviewed the synagogue's Senior Rabbi, Rabbi Sam Karff. I borrowed my father's dictation unit to record the conversation. We drafted interview questions around the dinner table the night before. Sitting with Rabbi Karff, he described what a rabbi does. You can hear my third-grader voice respond, "Oh, that's cool." I imagine that was when the seed was planted. Rabbi Karff and I stayed in touch through my years at HUC-JIR and beyond. He would always close his letters and emails to me the same way: "You were a great journalist, and an even better rabbi."

What excites you most about the transition year to come as you work side-by-side with Rabbi Kamrass? This transition year is a blessing. As we make this shift in rabbinic leadership, I am grateful to have the quality time to train with Rabbi Kamrass. His 40 years at Wise are a testament to his dedicated leadership, and I am eager to soak up as much as I can from him.

Social action is a huge part of what we do at Wise Temple. Can you speak to how you have prioritized social action in your past rabbinic roles? While in rabbinical school, I worked for Just Congregations, training in congregation-based community organizing. This approach has informed my rabbinate. In 2017, in partnership with a congregant who runs a local public health clinic, I created a network called BASIC (Berkshire Advocacy & Support for the Immigrant Community) to bring together houses of worship and human service agencies, coordinating care for

What are some of your hobbies? What do you like to do for fun? Family comes first. Liz and I love to hike and travel together. Last year, we spent an incredible 72 hours in Copenhagen. Our kids are also great travelers. I am an avid photographer and at-home cook. At Passover, I've held an annual matzah brei cookoff, and look forward to perhaps bringing that challenge to Wise Temple. When given leisure time, you'll often find me running, biking, playing tennis, or getting the occasional golf game in.

Tell us about your experience studying and living in Israel. How has that experience informed how you approach your work? I lived in Jerusalem during my first year of rabbinical school, I have led multiple missions to Israel including several Birthright trips, and my family and I lived in Tel Aviv for several months during my last sabbatical. Right now, Israel is front of mind. As an American congregational rabbi, I see my role as being focused on Israel education. I want to help elevate the conversation around Israel, fostering a sophisticated, forthright, and nuanced understanding of Israel, Israeli society, and others who live there and in the surrounding area.

What do you love most about being a rabbi? The rabbinate is about servant-leadership. I deeply value the meaningful connections with congregants that develop in both casual conversations and formal moments. There is nothing more rewarding than standing with a wedding couple under their chuppah, blessing b'nai mitzvah as they step up to the Torah, or holding a newborn

at their naming. And the conversation over a cup of coffee can be equally impactful. That's why a good portion of my first several months at Wise Temple will be focused on being out in the community, meeting many of you. I hope you'll take me up on the offer for a cup of coffee, to come to a house meeting, or to connect in one of the many learning opportunities we're putting together for these first months.
